Electricity always seeks a path to the ground, and because humans are made up mostly of water filled with all types of minerals, we conduct electricity. All we have to do is make contact and

devastating, or potentially lethal, injuries are instant.

It's important be safe with electricity whether you are inside or outside of the home.

If you are climbing trees or on a ladder, make sure that a limb is not touching a wire. Always look up and watch out for overhead lines, staying a minium of 10 feet away.

You may see a green box–such as pictured above–in your neighborhood. That's a transformer for underground power lines. Please don't sit on it, and never dig near it, even to plant a bush or a tree.

Remember to be safe around electricity when using all the appliances and tools in your home. When you use tools: look for frayed, damaged cords and prongs.

Remember, that Jackson Energy cares about your safety. We want you to go home to your families safely each and every day.

Yard sale signs, no trespassing signs, basketball hoops, satellite dishes and even birdhouses all pose a dangerous risk to utility workers. Not only is it dangerous—but it is also life threatening.

These items, along with the nails, staples and tacks used to hang them, can cause snags and tears in the utility workers' safety boots and rubber protective gear, which is the first line of protection from electrical shock in the event of an accident. It can also injure workers despite the safety gear they wear to avoid contact with rough edges.

In addition, anyone posting items on utility poles is also at risk of exposure to thousands of volts of electricity pulsing overhead. For your safety, always stay at least 10 feet away from utility poles.

Utility workers' jobs are dangerous enough—please do your part to help them stay safe by not attaching anything on utility poles.

# BUYING A NEW HOME?

## Make sure its electrical system is up to snuff

Have a licensed electrical inspector thoroughly check out any home you're buying, especially if it's older.

#### DURING AN INSPECTION, THE ELECTRICAL PROFESSIONAL WILL:

- Identify any fire or safety hazards, including frayed, exposed or damaged wires as well as inside and outside receptacles not protected with arc or ground fault circuit interrupters, and tamper-resistant outlet electrical receptacles.
- Make sure all the electrical components are working safely.
- Identify any problem areas/wiring mistakes.
- Help meet insurance risk assessment inspection requirements.

To be considered for this scholarship: APPLY ONLINE, or RETURN application to our office, or MAIL application postmarked no later than May 21, 2021

The scholarship amount will not exceed \$4,200.

1. Applicants must be at least a senior in high school.

2. Applicants shall enroll in the Somerset Lineman Training Center and begin the program by October 2021. The applicant chosen for the scholarship shall also acquire their CDL permit before beginning the program.

3. Applicants, their parents or legal guardians must be a Jackson Energy member and their primary residence or business served by the cooperative.

4. Students who apply for the scholarship will be required to interview with a Selection Committee consisting of Jackson Energy personnel.

5. Scholarships will be paid directly to Somerset Community College Lineman Training Center.

6. Applicants must not be a member of the immediate family of an employee or director of Jackson Energy Cooperative. Immediate family is defined as a spouse or a child of an employee or director.

7. Applicants shall not be previous winners of the Jackson Energy Scholarship Essay Contest.

8. Entries must be legible. Any entry that is not legible will be disqualified.
